

The Government has launched a national campaign, aimed at parents and carers, on the importance of school attendance. Our goal is to create a nurturing bond between parents and school, emphasising the pivotal role attendance has in enhancing their child's overall wellbeing. Being in school is essential to **your child's achievement**, **wellbeing**, and wider development.

- if your child is unhappy or having problems at school, please ring to discuss these issues.


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Arriving late to school may cause difficulties for your child
